The regular monthly meeting of Advisory Neighborhood Commission 1B occurred on Thursday, March 3, 2011, at 7:00 pm in the Reeves Center, Commissioner Juan Lopez, 1B07, Chairperson, presiding. Commissioner Myla Moss, 1B01, was present as Secretary. Other Commissioners present during the meeting: Aaron Spencer, 1B02, Sedrick Muhammad, 1B03, Deborah Thomas, 1B04, Mary Streett, Treasurer, 1B05, Charles Meisch, 1B06, Ahnna Smith, Vice Chairperson, 1B08, Lauren McKenzie, 1B09, Tony Norman, 1B10, E. Gail Anderson Holness, 1B11.

Chairperson Lopez made the following announcement:

- ✓ We ask that you put your cell phones on “vibrate” or turn them off.
- ✓ This meeting is audio-recorded for the public record and the draft minutes of the meeting, which will be published on our website as soon as possible.
- ✓ ANC 1B considers community input a priority and provides time at the beginning of each public meeting for constituents and “other affected persons” to express their views and concerns, ask questions, or make complaints. Each person is limited to three minutes to provide a fair opportunity for all to speak and still allow the Commission to conduct its necessary business. We ask that each speaker state for the public record her/his name, address and what organization s/he is representing, if any.
- ✓ We welcome and encourage public comment at appropriate points in the meeting. Normally we will ask for public comment on issues on the agenda before the Commission votes to take action.
- ✓ We ask that all those making presentations, asking questions, or making comments speak loudly and clearly for the benefit of our recording device. Please state your name, residence address, and what organization you represent. If you are representing yourself as a resident, rather than an organization, please say so.
- ✓ For the accuracy of our public records, we ask that all those making presentations, asking questions, or making comments complete the very brief speaker

information form located on the sign in table at the back of the room. Please give the completed form to our Staff Director, Jim Irwin, either before or after you speak to the Commission. The purpose of this form is to assure correct spelling of your name in the minutes, accurate address and accurate statement of representation.

Thank you for your attendance, participation and cooperation.

Chairperson Lopez noted the presence of a quorum and called the meeting to order at 7:10 PM.

Approval of Agenda

Chairperson Lopez asked if there were any additions to the agenda.

Commissioner Spencer asked that consideration of a voluntary agreement for the Islander Caribbean Restaurant be added to the agenda under the ABC Committee report.

The addition was approved by unanimous vote.

Commissioner Smith asked that a presentation be added under New Business from DC Water and Sewer Authority regarding the Bryant Street pumping project.

The addition was approved by unanimous vote.

Community Events and Announcements

Commissioner Muhammad announced that his single-member district meeting will be held on Wednesday, April 6, beginning at 7:00 PM at the Christopher Price House, 1301 Belmont Street N.W. The guest speaker will be Mr. Fred Moosally, Director of the Alcoholic Beverage Regulation Administration. This meeting is held in conjunction with MPD PSA 304.

Commissioner Meisch announced that residents of ANC 1B06 and surrounding blocks have noticed an uptick in crime. Unfortunately, some of this crime has gone unreported to the police. He reminded residents and Commissioners that if they “see something, say something.” Numerous crimes are the result of people getting into residential apartment buildings and stealing packages that have not been placed in a secure area. These thefts are not being reported to police. Commissioner Meisch urged everyone to call 911 if a package is stolen. That is a crime that should be reported to 911. If you see people loitering, congregating, or seem to be casing a house, call the police. The police cannot help prevent crime if they do not know about the crimes that are being committed. Residents provide important “eyes on the street” for the police. He asked everyone to pass this along to their friends and neighbors.

Commissioner Thomas added that it is very important that people who live in apartment buildings get to know the other residents of their buildings. She could not emphasize this enough. Many times, criminals get into buildings because residents let them in, not knowing whether they live there or not. It is so important to get to know your neighbors.

Chairperson Lopez announced that the Alcoholic Beverage Regulation Administration (ABRA) would be moving to the Reeves Center, 2000 14th Street N.W, fourth floor, on March 15th, opening on 8:30 AM. ABRA will close its office at its old location, 1250 U Street NW, on March 11th at 12 noon.

Chairperson Lopez also announced that ABRA was now accepting applications from eligible on-premise liquor retailers to register with ABRA by Thursday, March 10, 2011 to sell and serve alcoholic beverages during the beginning of daylight savings time between 3 AM and 4 AM on Sunday, March 13, 2011. To register, retailers must complete a registration form and submit it by Thursday, March 10th. ABRA will be notifying MPD of all registered establishments. In order to be eligible for the additional hour, a business must either (1) not have a voluntary agreement or (2) possess a voluntary agreement without any restrictions on hours.

Commissioner Smith announced that on Monday, February 28, the Department of Real Estate Services held a public hearing on the disposition of the Harrison School building located at 13th and V Streets N.W. The building was recently awarded to the Meridian Public Charter School. The hearing provided an opportunity for the community to ask questions.

Commissioner Anderson Holness announced that ANC 1B11 would hold its regular monthly meeting on Thursday, March 17th at 7:00 PM at the Kelly Miller LeDroit Senior Building at 2025 4th Street N.W.

Rev. Sandra Butler-Truesdale, representing DC Legendary Musicians, announced that her organization is looking for affordable housing for retired musicians and is working on developing health care and other benefits for them, as many have no benefits. She also announced that Marvin Gaye Day would be April 2nd, commemorating his birthday, and would be held at the Carnegie Library, Mount Vernon Square, from 12 PM to 4 PM. Marvin Gaye was a native Washingtonian.

Community Comments and Concerns

There were no community comments, complaints or questions.

Commissioner Moss submitted the minutes of the February 3, 2011 commission meeting for approval. There were no corrections or additions.

Design Review Applications and Design Review Committee Report

Commissioner Norman presented the report of the Design Review Committee:

The Design Review Committee met at the Thurgood Marshall Center, 1816 12th Street N.W., on Tuesday, February 15, 2010. The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Tony Norman at 6:38 PM. Committee members present were: David Corson, John Fonville, Joel Heisey, Scott Pomeroy, Sylvia Robinson

Others present were: Commissioner Charles Meisch, ANC 1B06, Commissioner Ahnna Smith, ANC 1B08, Kevin Brown, Neighborhood Development Company, Jason Vargas, Neighborhood Development Company, Aaron Rinaca, resident, 933 Westminster Street N.W., David Schaefer, Urban Essentials, Andrea Doughty, DC Arts District, Sandra Butler-Truesdale, Emma Mae Gallery, Bob Riviello, Rock Star Wraps.

SUMMARY

The Committee reviewed three projects:

1. 933 Westminster Street N.W.: Mr. Aaron Rinaca, owner of the property, requests ANC 1B support before the Historic Preservation Review Board for the conceptual design of a new front basement entrance
2. DC Arts Project Public Space Application to DDOT to hang light pole banners for maximum permitted time period of one year: further review and discussion of the project and concerns raised by the MidCity Business Association.
3. 1225 Fairmont Street N.W.: a vacant nine-unit building. The Neighborhood Development Corporation will renovate the building into 11 units and sell them as condominiums. They are seeking general support from ANC 1B for the project's conceptual design.

RECOMMENDATION

933 Westminster Street N.W.

Mr. Joel Heisey moved that the Committee support the design concept for the construction of the front basement entrance for 933 Westminster Street N.W.

Mr. Scott Pomeroy seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted unanimously, 7 yes, 0 no.

DC Arts District Public Space Permit Application to DDOT

Ms. Sylvia Robinson moved that the Committee recommend that ANC 1B support the application of the DC Arts District to the District Department of Transportation for a public space permit on the basis of a compromise stated by Ms. Andrea Doughty and Mr. Scott Pomeroy, namely that the DC Arts District would remove its banners during the permitted period of installation of up to one year to make room for banners produced by the MidCity Business Association, when such banners were ready for installation, and provided that the maintenance and repair of the banners will be improved and implemented on a regular schedule.

Mr. Joel Heisey seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted, 6 yes, 0 no, 1 abstain. Mr. Pomeroy abstained.

1225 Fairmont Street N.W.

Mr. David Corson moved that the Committee recommend that ANC 1B support the conceptual design for the renovation of 1225 Fairmont Street N.W.

Mr. John Fonville seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted, 5 yes, 1 no, 1 abstain. Ms. Robinson voted no. Mr. Heisey abstained.

REPORT ON RECOMMENDATIONS

933 Westminster Street N.W.

Mr. Aaron Rinaca said this house had been a two-unit rental property for the past fifty years. He and his partner purchased the house with a renovation loan and plan to renovate it into a single-family residence with basement rental

apartment. To get a certificate of occupancy, they must construct a front entrance for the basement.

- Mr. Rinaca and his partner will live in the house.
- They have applied to the Historic Preservation Review Board for conceptual approval of their plan to emulate the architecture of a basement front entrance at 915 Westminster Street, which was designed by the same architect who designed 933 Westminster Street.
- They are proposing to alter an existing historical stoop. The stoop has been badly damaged and poorly maintained over the years. It needs to be replaced, one way or another.
- They are requesting relocation of the gas and water meters out of public view.
- They are proposing to change the front façade to angle the brick. Brick masons who have been consulted say there would be no problem emulating the brickwork on the façade of 915 Westminster Street.
- Their research has revealed several properties by the same architect that have the same front basement entrance design, establishing that the basement entrance of 915 Westminster Street is the original entrance.

DC Arts District Public Space Permit Application to DDOT

The Committee revisited the application of the DC Arts District to the Department of Transportation to hang banners on light poles within the boundaries of ANC 1B for the maximum period permitted.

The Committee had recommended that ANC 1B support the application at the December 2010 Commission meeting. However, due to issues raised by the MidCity Business Association, the Commission deferred consideration of the application and asked the DC Arts District and the MidCity Business Association to return to the Design Review Committee and resolve the issues between the two groups.

Ms. Andrea Doughty and Rev. Sandra Butler-Truesdale represented the DC Arts District. Representatives of the MidCity Business Association, who had been invited, did not attend. Mr. Scott Pomeroy, a former board member of MidCity Business Association, explained the concerns and objections of the Association.

After an extended discussion that involved detailed review of the viewpoints of both the DC Arts District and the MidCity Business Association, it became apparent that a compromise resolution of the problem was at hand. Ms. Doughty and Mr. Pomeroy indicated that the DC Arts District's statement that they would be willing to remove their banners during the

permitted installation period to make room for banners produced by the MidCity Business Association was an acceptable compromise.

One of the major concerns expressed by Mr. Pomeroy was the number of banners that appeared to be in disrepair. Ms. Doughty stated that anyone observing a banner in need of maintenance or repair should contact her at the DC Arts District: Andrea Doughty, Project Leader, Arts District Marketing Project, andrea@capitalpolicies.com, office phone 202-319-1151, cell phone 202-439-4127. In addition Ms. Doughty referred people to the organization's website, <http://www.dcartsdistrict.blogspot.com/>

On the basis of the verbal representations of both Ms. Doughty and Mr. Pomeroy, the Committee approved the recommendation stated above.

1225 Fairmont Street N.W.

Mr. Jason Vargas, Neighborhood Development Corporation, said that they are asking the Commission for a general letter of support for the conceptual design for their project.

- This project is located in Commissioner Ahnna Smith's single-member district.
- 1225 Fairmont Street NW is a vacant nine-unit building. NDC will renovate the building into 11 units and sell them as condominiums.
- The property was originally owned by the federal Department of Housing and Urban Development, and then acquired by the DC Department of Housing and Community Development. NCD was the successful bidder for the building. The building does have HUD covenants.
- The project is "by right," but the policy of NCD is to solicit the support of the affected ANC and the neighborhood.
- To comply with the HUD covenants, they are proposing to sell three units at market rate, three at 100% AMI (Average Median Income) and five at 80% AMI.
- Ms. Robinson observed that this did not constitute affordable housing and objected to DCDHCD transferring public property in a low-income area without providing for affordable housing. Mr. Vargas responded that their submission to DCDHCD and proposal complied with the HUD covenants.
- There will be six parking spaces in the rear of the building. Commissioner Ahnna Smith expressed concern about access to the parking and said numerous constituents were concerned. Mr. Vargas agreed to provide plans showing parking access.

- Committee members expressed concern about the proposed design, which appears out of keeping with the neighborhood architecture, and the apparent lack of windows.
- Commissioner Smith commended NDC for comprehensive efforts to communicate with the neighbors and said that neighbors are very happy to see the property being developed. The neighbors feel comfortable with NDC and have found them very responsive.

Commissioner Norman moved that ANC 1B support the design concept for the construction of the front basement entrance for 933 Westminster Street N.W.

Commissioner Muhammad seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted unanimously, 11 yes, 0 no.

Commissioner Norman moved that ANC 1B support the D.C. Arts District application for a public space permit to hang light pole banners within the ANC 1B boundaries for a maximum period of 180 days.

Commissioner Smith seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted 9 yes, 0 no, 2 abstain. Commissioners Anderson Holness and Meisch abstained.

Georgia Avenue Community Development Task Force proposal regarding Bruce Monroe School site

Commissioner Norman said that the Georgia Avenue Community Development Task Force is asking ANC 1B to sign a letter requesting the D.C. Public Schools to clarify and justify their proposal to re-establish a school in the Bruce Monroe school building. The site had been closed and proposals to convert the site to a public park or some other public use had been considered. The letter seeks to get DC Public Schools to respond to specific questions.

Commissioner Anderson Holness questioned why the commission was being asked to comment on a project not located within ANC 1B.

Commissioner Norman said that the location was directly across the street from ANC 1B and right next to Commissioner McKenzie's single-member district.

Commissioner McKenzie said that the neighboring residents appeared to favor a public park over a public school use.

Commissioner Moss said that two years of studies and surveys had resulted in the proposal to utilize the site as a public park.

Commissioner Anderson Holness said that the proposed letter was premature and that the questions to be asked could be asked in other venues without getting ANC 1B involved in an issue that did not relate to the commission's area.

Commissioner Norman moved that ANC 1B authorize Chairman Lopez to sign the letter proposed by the Georgia Avenue Task Force.

Commissioner McKenzie seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted by roll call vote, 5 yes, 1 no, 5 abstain. The roll call vote was:

Commissioner Moss moved that ANC 1B protest the applicant of Yetenbi Restaurant for a new Retail Class C Tavern license on the basis of peace, order, quiet and parking.

Commissioner Meisch seconded the motion.

The motion was adopted unanimously, 11 yes, 0 no.

Commissioner Anderson Holness noted that she had submitted a proposed voluntary agreement between the commission and H2 LLC in advance of the last commission meeting and that sufficient information and time for review had been provided.

Commissioner Anderson Holness moved that ANC 1B approve the proposed voluntary agreement with H2 LLC.

Commissioner Muhammad seconded the motion.

Commissioner Spencer noted that neither Commissioner Anderson Holness nor the business owner had attended the ABC Committee meeting so the Committee did not have sufficient information to make a recommendation.

Commissioner Anderson Holness moved that discussion of the motion be closed.

The motion failed for lack of a second.

Commissioner Moss noted that two applicants for licenses at the last commission meeting had not been required to negotiate voluntary agreements and that it was inconsistent to delay consideration of the H2 LLC voluntary agreement.

Chairperson Lopez noted for the record that the H2 LLC voluntary agreement had been provided to commissioners before the last commission meeting.

Commissioner Norman said he felt very strongly that voluntary agreements must be vetted by the ABC Committee before coming to the commission.

Commissioner Muhammad said, for the record, that Mr. Sheldon Scott, the owner of H2 LLC owns other businesses in ANC 1B, is a great partner with the community, and does a great job. He should not be subjected to a lot of red tape because he has already demonstrated his commitment to the community.

Chairperson Lopez called for a vote on Commissioner Anderson Holness's motion. The motion failed by a roll call vote of 4 yes, 5 no, 2 abstain. The roll call vote was:

GRANTS COMMITTEE REPORT

The Committee met at 7:00 PM on Tuesday, February 22, 2011 in the Commission office, 2000 14th Street N.W., Suite 100B.

Those present included Chairperson Halima Roebuck, Commissioner Lauren McKenzie, Brianne Nadeau

The Chairperson began the meeting with a review of the grants already awarded for FY2011. \$3,000 of \$10,000 has already been awarded. She noted the ANC averages two grants per month.

The committee discussed the nature of the grants that had been awarded, whether they had embodied the spirit of the grant guidelines and had contributed to the community.

The committee discussed the guidelines adopted by the Commission in 2010 and whether anything needed to be updated or changed. The committee agreed that the grant application questions should be updated to incorporate the new guidelines and include a template for a budget.

The committee also agreed there should be a process for highlighting the programs funded with the grants. The chairperson will follow up with recipients and post highlights to the community lists every few months.

New Business

Commissioner Spencer noted that there would be no presentation from the Capital Pride Parade because their permit application had been denied by the Fire Chief.
